Hello and Happy New Year!

As I prepare this, my second address to the membership, I sincerely hope that you, your family and loved ones are healthy and safe, despite the extreme winter storms, sub-zero temperatures and catastrophic economic conditions in the US and world markets today.

In light of the uncertainty overshadowing so many organizations, it is an appropriate time to provide you with a "State of the Fraternity" address which will focus primarily on these areas of importance: Governance, Communications, Programs & Services, Management (particularly as a function of financial solvency), Growth, Outreach and

Preservation & History.

Much of what I will be sharing with you has evolved from our Strategic Organizational Plan, which outlines the Fraternity's key goals and objec-tives. As your elected Grand President, I realize this important document, created from the consensus of our members and ratified with board approval, can only take wing once it is translated into specific actions on the part of your elected leaders, executive staff and member volunteers. That is why, in December, prior to the ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting in Orlando, I met with our Executive Director, Joan Rogala, to do just that – to look at our plan with a critical eye and

set the wheels in motion for positive action.

Governance: A leadership succession plan for the transition of Grand Council Officers is high on the list of priorities. There is also a need to better prepare our Fraternity leaders for their roles in governing and guiding Fraternity business. Accordingly, a complete Board Orientation Program will be held as the first order of business during the Spring Grand Council meeting held in conjunction with the APhA meeting in San Antonio.

Communications: LKS has recently made a conscious decision to "go green". In the fall of 2008, the Alumni News and LinKS publications were disseminated via electronic broadcast email. Our flagship publication – the Blue and Gold Triangle – is being broadcast electronically to about 80% of our membership. The response from members has been very positive, and we have been able to improve the timeliness of the distribution of these important communication tools. You should also be receiving more frequent email blasts to maintain a constant flow of information and provide you with important news, announcements, and deadlines.

Programs & Services: Lambda Kappa Sigma affiliated programs, on both a National and local level, remain strong. Last fall each collegiate chapter was challenged to submit a minimum of one applicant for the 2008 LKS Educational Grants program. In an overwhelming response, the Educational Grants Committee received more than twice the number of qualified applicants than ever in the program's history. Congratulations and many thanks go to Carrie Molesa and her committee members for awarding grants to seven deserving members, and all within the tight deadlines for completion.

After a record year for donations from LKS last year, our support for Project HOPE continues strong thus far this Biennium. The use of a member poll to obtain input on our choice of a Women's Health Issue topic was new for the last Biennium, and will continue to be used to ensure the two recomplishes time. ue to be used to ensure that we are committing time and resources to issues that are most important to our members. Our annual Campaign for Progress, which solicits support for a targeted need for Fraternity growth and development, has been more successful each year. With continued enthusiastic participation in our programs by Fraternity members, our traditional programs will thrive, and opportunities for new programs can be explored.

Management: The financial status of the Fraternity is, at present, stable. I am pleased to share with you that two of our long-standing industry colleagues have already offered their support in 2009. Thanks go out to Merck and Company, and especially David Miller, for ongoing, multi-decade support for the LKS/Merck Vanguard Leadership Award. In addition, another long-standing industry sponsor, SUPERVALU Pharmacies, has made a generous donation to the Educational Trust to support the 2009 Educational Grants program. A heartfelt thank you is extended to Christine Perry, who was instrumental in garnering this support. Please be sure to acknowledge the support of these friends of LKS whenever the opportunity presents itself. opportunity presents itself.

In other financial news, for the first time ever, 100% of collegiate chapters submitted payments and related reports on time and without errors. Kudos to the chapter officers who are demonstrating incredible leadership abilities and commitment to excellence! My thanks go to Tiffany Self, LKS Grand Treasurer, who works closely with the International Office to monitor our budget and identify opportunities to preserve resources and improve efficiency without

sacrificing member services or quality.

Growth: Yes, in these trying times when other organizations are hunkering down, we are growing! Chapters are successfully retaining existing members, and recruitment of new members may exceed last year by more than 10%. We also have the potential to charter a new chapter in the very near future at Northeastern Ohio University Colleges of Medicine and Pharmacy, which I visited in January.

The International Office staff has also grown; Kathy Uy, whom many of you met in Savannah, has been given the official title of Member Services and Special Events Coordinator. She is already deeply involved in working with the host chapter in planning the upcoming regional meeting in Hartford.

To further support the growth of quality members, the Recruitment Boot Camp will be held in conjunction with the Regional Meeting. Selected members of collegiate chapters will attend the Boot Camp with the goal of identifying, recruiting, and retaining new members who have the qualities that will make them active members for life. will make them active members for life.

Outreach: We are impacting our communities! In addition to our National Philanthropy, Project HOPE, at least 32 other philanthropic organizations and local community efforts have benefited from active support by LKS members. Already during the current Biennium more than \$32,000 in cash donations and thousands of hours in volunteer time and talents have been contributed by our local collegiate

and alumni chapters. Amazing . . .

Preservation & History: We are poised to create historical milestones! Plans for the 100th year celebration are well under way. It will be an incredible event, one no member will want to miss! We will launch into our second century of promoting the profession of pharmacy among women in - where else - Boston! Donna Dancer, chair of the Archives Committee, has been actively involved in compiling, organizing, and preserving historical fraternity documents, pictures, correspondence, and other significant historical items. Allow me to introduce...

Over the years, a number of companies have given us wonderful images of pharmacy to collect and admire. It's unlikely that any of us could have become pharmacists and not seen the great images commissioned nearly 60 years ago by Parke, Davis & Company and brought to life by artist Robert Thom.

My own collections include many Schering mortars and pestles as well as the blue and white tiles from Burroughs Wellcome. Ciba Geigy calendars with beautiful images of Switzerland are also classics, along with spatulas from Eli Lilly and a myriad of wondrous old bottles, graduates, scales, and show globes that immediately conjure up the image of pharmacy – both past and present.

Allow me to introduce another company that is currently providing the profession with a loving glimpse into its past - and images of contemporary practice. Apothecary Images, Inc. is a new leader in the preservation – through artwork and photography - of the paraphernalia that represent pharmacy.

Mr. Philip McCarthy is the founder of this company based in St. Catherines, Ontario, Canada. I first met Phil at an AACP meeting where he was displaying his creations. I was immediately drawn to the images because of their quality and wonderful composition. They were a perfect marriage of two of my favorite hobbies - pharmacy antiques and photography. I was hooked - and since my birthday was at hand, I treated myself to my favorite print. It now hangs prominently in my home along-side other treasured pharmacy antiques.

Over 20 years ago, Phil began collecting 18th and 19th century pharmacy and medical antiques. As his collection grew, he felt compelled to share the beauty and history of his pieces with the health professionals in these fields. Working with acclaimed photographer, Jerry Zolner, he created groupings of his collection and preserved them as a series of high quality photographic images which are now available to the public. The photography captures the perfect balance of light and dark, color and form, energy and composition, technique and soul. They are remarkable in capturing every detail.

Not content to only "look back on the history of pharmacy", Phil also has prints of more contemporary items. Graceful graduated beakers and bottles in clear and cobalt glass are beautiful in their simplicity. In March of 2008, Phil announced the "Pharmacy Practice – Series 1" collection. These 25 prints showcase pharmacists engaged in contemporary professional roles. From hospitals to nursing homes, to acute care centers, retail settings, research centers and classrooms, each image places the spotlight on the vital roles played by pharmacists in the health care world today.

Dr. Victor A. Yanchick, Dean, Virginia Commonwealth University, School of Pharmacy (and a talented artist on the side) is also working in collaboration with Apothecary Images to create a series of watercolor paintings of pharmacy imag-Proceeds from this work will benefit

the scholarship fund at VCU's School of Pharmacy.

At this time there are well over 200 prints available for the discriminating collector. Such items make ideal gifts to recognize topperformance and achievement, for graduation or retirement gifts, to raise money through auctions or raffles - or for any occasion where a beautiful classic token is desired. At this time, the work of Apothecary Images is on display in offices, conference rooms, and hallways at many of our Schools and Colleges of Pharmacy in the U.S. and Canada. They also are prominently displayed in retail and institutional pharmacy settings as well as in homes.

In addition to pharmacy and medical images, Phil also has images related to Chiropractic, Physiotherapy, Massage Therapy, and Dentistry. The watercolors and oils of Barry McCarthy are also available (beautiful landscapes, seascapes, and still life as well as portraits). The whimsical and fanciful "Illustrations by Erin" are especially created to appeal to children and have found their way into the offices of pediatricians, pediatric dentists, and hospital pediatric wards. The Risks of Social Networking

In a society that is rapidly becoming more technologically advanced, more people are joining social networking sites such as Facebook and MySpace. While these sites are great ways to stay in touch with old friends and classmates, it can be detrimental to those who do not actively monitor their information.

In a January 2008 report MySpace had over 110 million and Facebook had 68 million monthly active users. With a 47% yearly growth in users, social networking is extremely popular and allows people to increase their social, intellectual, and cultural capital. The reasons for contributing, according to a Microsoft report are the following:

- 1. Keep in touch with family and friends (75%)
- 2. Being "nosey" 62%
- 3. Express my opinions and views (55%)
- 4. Meet people with similar interests (49%)
- 5. Specific reason, documenting trip to wedding, etc (13%)
- 6. It's a good way to date (7%)

70% social networking activity occurs in the evening, 37% of participants visit daily and 41% visit a few times per week. Photos, diaries, and music are the preferred content to put on user's own pages, and personal experiences, movies, family, and travel are what people want to see on their friends' blogs or profiles.

Your future friends, employers and colleagues are watching.

A new survey of 500 top colleges found that 10% of admissions officers acknowledged looking at social-networking sites to evaluate applicants. Of those colleges making use of the online information, 38% said that what they saw "negatively affected" their views of the applicant. Only a quarter of the schools checking the sites said their views were improved, according to the survey by education company Kaplan.

More colleges are developing or publicizing online social networking policies for students, experts say. USA TODAY researched social networking policies for 27 schools, including the University of Iowa, which will implement a new monitoring policy. Last fall, pictures emerged on Facebook of two 19-year old Hawkeye

football players holding cash and liquor bottles. Schools are warning students of the potential dangers of sites such as Facebook and MySpace through student handbook policies, meetings, coach/advisor discussions and even letters. Some schools don't have a specific policy but allow coaches/teachers to monitor at their discretion, or take action if inappropriate material online is reported.

Employers everywhere are using social networking sites as another way to screen job applicants, often times even before an interview. Users are able to post anything about themselves such as their religious background, political interest, sexual orientation, activities, photos and other personal information that could give employers a better look at the individual. According to the search firm ExecuNet, "4/5 recruiters regularly run searches on the Internet to screen applicants" and "1/3 job seekers were found to be eliminated from consideration based on the information that was found" such as suggestive photos or dialogue. Employers say that there is a lot of pressure to hire the right individual the first time around. Often once hired, it is more difficult to discipline the individual or get rid of them if they are not living up to their expectations.

Many users of social network sites may believe that they can protect themselves from the scrutiny of possible future employers by changing their privacy settings. Employers may still have their Facebook accounts from when they were in college and still belong to their college's network. Some employers even hire college students to use their accounts to look at prospective employees who may go to school with them. The only effective way to protect oneself is to monitor what is posted on their personal page.

It has been brought into question as to whether or not this is an invasion of privacy. The answer is hard to determine. According to past court decisions, when a person willingly shares and makes information public that they intended to keep private, they may be putting their right to privacy at risk. The bottom line is that the only way to protect oneself from job seekers is to monitor the information that is posted on social network sites.

Remember whatever you do online, it goes onto your permanent record. You may think in a moment of frivolity that you should share a photo or video. But if you put it on the Internet, assume it will be there forever.

Always be mindful of your privacy. It may be 'cool' to share where exactly you're at. But anything you share can, and will, get picked up. Be careful about what you share. You don't have to share everything. Be cognizant about how many details you share.

Be respected. If you handle yourself with professionalism, you'll be perceived as a very mature individual.

Your future friends, employers and colleagues are watching. We've said it twice now, but we cannot stress it enough: What you put online now will follow you throughout your life. Things like Google Cache will make sure of it. Before you post that rant on your blog full of cursing and angst... ask yourself if that is something you want your children or future spouse to read. Would a prospective employer be turned off by what you've said? Whatever you do, it's going to be there. Always be careful when you put things 'out there' online. And of course, remember that you don't know who is watching.


core values of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

A Look Into the Diagnosis and Stages of Cervical Cancer

This past summer at Lambda Kappa Sigma's Biennial Convention, the new women's health issue was decided; the issue chosen was cervical cancer. Many have probably heard of it, especially since the cervical cancer vaccine Gardasil was advertised on television not long ago. However, the commercials always failed to explain the cancer or how it is diagnosed. Hopefully after reading this article you will better understand the diagnosis and stages of the cancer itself.

The best prevention for cervical cancer is a yearly Papanicolaou test (also called Pap smears or Pap tests) from a gynecologist. A pap smear is a test that involves gathering some cervical cells from the outside of the cervix and inspecting them under a microscope to look for any abnormal cells. The grading system consists of five classes to describe the results of the test. Class I is the result when cells are normal and have no signs of malignancy. If atypical cells are found, this does not mean an individual has cancer nor is it a precursor to cancer. Abnormal cells can be caused by infections and are often temporary. In this case, the result would be a considered class II. If the result is considered class III, there are abnormal cells that are not invasive but they could also change back to normal. Class IV also consists of abnormal cells that are less likely to change back to normal than the class III cell types. Class V is the result when the individual has invasive cancer. If a pap test ever shows abnormal cells, the gynecologist may recommend retesting in a few months to assure that the abnormal cells are not due to an infection. If the test once more proves that the cervix has abnormalities, then the gynecologist may want to look at the tissue of the cervix with a colposcope.

In this procedure, the doctor will also biopsy a portion of the irregular tissue to send to a pathologist to examine. If it is found that the tissue is indeed cancerous, then treatment will be started.¹

Treatment and prognosis are dependent on the extent of the cancer. Cervical cancer has different stages defined; the American Joint Committee on Cancer's (AJCC) TNM classification. TNM classification system has three parts to it. The T represents the size of the tumor; N describes lymph node involvement, and M stands for distant metastasis (spread of cancer to other parts of the body). Within in each part there are different numbers that represent the assessment of the tumor, nodes, or metastasis. The AJCC's definition of the cancer stages involve each of the three parts of the TNM classification and have stages 0-IV. The most important part of preventing cervical cancer is annual Papanicolaou tests from a gynecologist. This assures that any abnormalities are caught early and watched for development to allow for a better prognosis for the individual. It's also encouraged that females 9 to 26 years of age get the Gardasil vaccine to help improve chance of avoiding cervical cancer. 3

Lambda Kappa Sigma History Willette McKeever Cheever – Founder

Every sister's favorite named founder, Willette Marie McKeever was born on February 6, 1894. She enrolled in the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, graduated in 1917, and was one of the eight students at the College that formed a little luncheon club that grew into Lambda Kappa Sigma. Willette studied dancing all her life, both here in the United States and in Europe. She was a dancing teacher all throughout her adult life. She had been President of the American Society of Teachers of Dancing, the oldest institution of dancing in the United States. In addition, Willette was a serious student of the piano. She married Austin W. Cheever, a physician, and opened a dance studio, the McKeever Studio of Dancing, next door to her husband's medical office at 10 Nahant Street in Lynn, Massachusetts.

Over her lifetime Willette and her husband spent many summers in Europe, Cuba, traveling the United States and at their summer home in Hyannis Port on Cape Cod. At the 25th Silver Anniversary Convention of Lambda Kappa Sigma held at the Hotel Statler in Boston in 1938, Willette Cheever was a member of the Formal Reception Committee. She had her dancing pupils provide a dance recital at the opening session on June 23, 1938 and at the Final Banquet the following Monday

evening. In the sixties, Willette and Dr. Cheever moved to Hawaii where they resided until her death in January 1970.

Patricia Pentleton, a 50 year member of Alpha Chapter, was in the seventh grade when she took ballroom dancing lessons from Willette McKeever Cheever. The one thing that Pat remembers about Willette is that she always wore red shoes when she was teaching. After dance class Pat and her friends would go across the street to her father's drug store for ice cream because the pharmacy had a huge soda fountain with 18 stools.

When Pat enrolled at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and joined Lambda Kappa Sigma she realized that Willette was one of the Founders of LKS. At that time Willette had sold her dance studio and the medical office had been closed as Dr Cheever and Willette had moved to Hawaii for retirement. In 1966, Pat and fellow Alpha sister, Judy McCarthy went to Hawaii on a vacation and called Willette on the phone telling her they were both former dance school pupils, from Lynn, MA and members of Lambda Kappa Sigma. Willette communicated that she was enjoying her retirement and remembered Pat's father Ray McGarvey. Both Judy and Pat remember that this conversation was the highlight of their Hawaiian trip.
