While several important decisions were made at the convention, I would like to focus on the decision to adopt the proposed Brand Platform, and specifically the Core Values, and the impact the adoption of these values will have on the future of Lambda Kappa Sigma.

I'd like you to take a moment and clear your mind of the seemingly millions of thoughts that cross the landscape of your consciousness, and settle in to think about Lambda Kappa Sigma. We are a sizable organization, with active chapters across the continent, and members around the world. We are a significant organization, impacting campuses and communities through our professional programs and community service projects. We are an organization in constant transition, with every generation represented amongst our members. Envision a wheel with six spokes, each one representing a Core Value: Sisterhood, Integrity, Leadership, Scholarship, Philanthropy, and Outreach. You and your chapter are at the center of the wheel, responsible for connecting each Core Value with the other five. The outside of the wheel is formed by the Fraternity Leadership, responsible for maintaining the balance necessary to keep each spoke strong. The spokes provide a critical connection between the Fraternity Leadership and you, the member. Without the center of the wheel, there can be no progress – the spokes become useless, lack purpose, and cause the wheel to collapse. The breakdown of a single spoke causes stress on all the other spokes, leads to inefficiency, and the eventual failure of the wheel to operate. Without the outside of the wheel, there is no balance, and no ability to keep or change direction in response to bumps in the road ahead. And what is my point? If the wheel gets larger, but the spokes stay the same in diameter, the wheel becomes fragile. In order for a larger wheel to continue to operate well, the spokes must be

reinforced to accommodate the additional stress of a larger wheel. In other words, our Core Values must be the perhaps the strongest element of our fraternal characteristics in order to continue to grow and move forward.

These Core Values are intended to guide our internal conduct as well as our relationships with those around us. If everyone focuses on bringing these Core Values to life with every Fraternity event, our success is guaranteed. I feel it is imperative that each and every member learn these Core Values and incorporate them into all Fraternity events. I also feel that each person may have their own personal definition for each of these values. I invite you to spend some time over the next few weeks to really learn how your members interpret these six words that will come to guide our future. Ask each member to define each of the Core Values and give an example of how your chapter either has demonstrated or will demonstrate a commitment to each value. Discuss the results of the survey and come up with a consensus definition for each value. You might even include these Core Values on your meeting agenda to discuss what actions have taken place to demonstrate a chapter commitment to these values. When making decisions about activities, ask the important questions that will help you evaluate the merit of the activity. Is the activity in alignment with the Core Values? Will participation strengthen any of the Core Values for your chapter as a whole? How will the activity benefit your members – even if it is a fund-raising event for a charity or philanthropy?

I am excited about the decisions made by the Convention body, and applaud all who participated in the discussions held during the business sessions. I have a strong belief that the combined efforts of each chapter to utilize our Core Values as a guide for decision making and leadership activities will allow the creation of a stronger bond among all members. Strengthening these bonds is critical, and will become a greater challenge as we continue to grow and move forward with our mission. But challenges are simply opportunities in disguise. And I know our members – we never miss a great opportunity!

I'm looking forward to another great biennium and the opportunity to get to know even more of you on a more personal level. This is going to be a great ride – let's get the wheel rolling!

Brand Platform

What is a brand platform? Several definitions can be found, but in general, a brand platform is a set of guidelines and statements that govern all aspects of a major brand. Elements of a brand platform include the mission, identity attributes, value proposition, and tagline.

The mission should state the purpose and driving philosophy of a brand in a clear, succinct, and compelling way. The identity attributes are words or phrases that describe the brand at its core. A value proposition differentiates a brand from its competition. And a tagline is a slogan or statement of the brand, and should be short, pithy, and smart.

Why has LKS adopted the concept of a brand platform at this time? AS LKS continues to grow, we are beginning the vital process of what I would call "Selected Standardization". This means reviewing Fraternity processes at the national as well as the local level, and ensuring that critical core processes and activities are aligned with the true intent of the Fraternity. Although each chapter may have – and in fact is encouraged to have – individual traditions, there are certain core processes that must be nearly identical across all chapters to ensure the continuity of the LKS "brand" throughout the organization.

We actually began this process with adoption of the Code of Conduct and the requirement that all members document a commitment to compliance by signing a copy and keeping it on file. A brand platform allows all members to contribute to increased recognition of LKS on a broader scale by repeated exposure of the elements of the brand platform during public events. Think of taglines you know ("Eat Fresh" – Subway; "What can Brown do for you?" – UPS). With enough exposure, people will begin to identify our chosen tagline with LKS. This increased recognition can lead to greater opportunities for expansion and outside support for Fraternity functions.

The following Brand Platform has been adopted:

Mission: Lambda Kappa Sigma is dedicated to the advancement of women in the profession of pharmacy

Core Values (Identity attributes): Sisterhood, Integrity, Leadership, Scholarship, Philanthropy, Outreach

Vision (value proposition): Lambda Kappa Sigma is the professional organization of choice for women in pharmacy

Tagline: Shaping the professionals of pharmacy

Lambda Kappa Sigma has a mission statement in the By-Laws, and the Brand Platform is not intended to replace that – any change in the mission statement requires a By-Laws change and a vote by the general membership. The mission as stated in the Brand Platform is simply a shorter, more concise version intended to fit with the concept of effective marketing of our recognized LKS brand.

Please take some time to consider how your chapter can begin to utilize the Brand Platform – or some of the individual elements of the platform – in your recruitment activities and communications. When the Brand Platform becomes second nature to each of us it will become a valuable marketing tool and a concise reminder of who we are and what we do every day.

Reaching Across Five Decades

An Interview with Nancy Stevens Keen, Phi Chapter by Avis J. Ericson, Chair, Trust Liaison Committee

In 2011 we will mark the anniversary of the very first LKS educational grant ever given. Knowing that fact set me to wondering “who received it, why, who selected her for this special honor, what has she been up to since then, where is she, wouldn’t it be fun to link-up with her and learn what she is all about at this juncture...” along with a host of other curiosities. It really didn’t take much digging to find this person and to learn the answers to the above questions – so let me share them with you.

During the 1958-1960 biennium, a Scholarship Committee was formed to review the possibility of creating a National Scholarship Award for LKS. Members of this committee were Margit Harrison (Chair), Harriet Lescauski, and Virginia Osol. In 1960 they presented a plan to the convention body to offer a \$200 scholarship annually to a deserving member in the upper classes based on scholarship and need. This was approved. The committee made chapters aware of the scholarship and encouraged applications. In 1961, the very first recipient was named and invited to attend the 1962 Golden Anniversary Convention in Boston. In the past five decades, over 350 LKS Educational Grants have been given, and the numbers just keep on growing thanks to the generous support of the LKS Educational Trust by our members and chapters.

During the 1960-61 academic year, the Phi Collegiate Advisor, Patricia Weinswig, took the Chapter President aside and suggested that she apply for this scholarship. She agreed to support the application with a letter of recommendation. The Chapter President agreed to apply and was both surprised and honored to learn several months later that she had been

selected. That young woman was Nancy E. Stevens (now Keen) a student in the third-year of the 5-year pharmacy degree program at Butler University’s College of Pharmacy. Nancy graduated in 1963 along with classmate Marcia Harms (and only 3 other women along with 40 men).

Nancy was invited to attend the Boston Convention. To stretch her dollars, she took a Greyhound bus from her home in Liberty, Indiana to the site. She remembers being at the Somerset Hotel and visiting historical attractions like Bunker Hill and the Old North Church. She met Grand President Julia Pishalski and was given her scholarship by Margit Harrison, the Scholarship Committee Chair. She even managed to hold on to her certificate all these years!

Nancy grew up on a small farm in the small town of Liberty, IN (east of Indianapolis near the Ohio border). She was good at science and determined to get a college education. She started work at age 15 and had a drug store job after school to earn money where she learned to appreciate the merits of pharmacy as a profession. At one point, someone told her that she could not become a pharmacist. With all of her confidence, she immediately replied “Don’t tell me I can’t do this!”

Nancy had her heart set on attending Butler University but others tried to persuade her to go to Purdue. Tuition at Butler was ~\$250/semester while Purdue’s was only ~\$80/semester. “Rich girls go to Butler” was also part of the push but Nancy was not to be pushed. For her, Purdue was just too big; Butler was small and had an excellent program and reputation plus they offered her an entering scholarship. Determination should be her middle name.

After graduation, Nancy worked in the Lobraico Pharmacy (owned by Adele Lowe’s father) and worked along side Adele for a year. She later went to work for Hook’s Drug and became a District Manager. After what she describes as “a very good career that made her happy”, Nancy retired in 2007 – for about six months. Armed with her skills and desire to keep busy, Nancy re-entered pharmacy on a part-time basis and continues in that role today. She also serves on the Hook’s Drug Foundation.

She and her husband Fred have one son and live in Greenfield, IN. She is making plans to attend the 2011 Convention in Detroit to mark the official 50th anniversary of her Craven grant. She provided a letter of greetings to be read at the Educational Trust Breakfast on July 31st in Pittsburgh.

With half of a century of hindsight, LKS can be very proud that Nancy Stevens Keen was chosen as our first Cora E. Craven educational grant recipient. Her enthusiasm and dedication to the profession makes us all proud.

2010-2012 Women's Health Issue: Ovarian Cancer

Many of us know that October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and that the color pink and the pink ribbon are the universal signs of breast cancer. However, did you know that September is Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month and that the sign of ovarian cancer awareness is the teal ribbon? Well, now you do, and over the next two years, we will explore the many facets of ovarian cancer together.

Ovarian cancer accounts for three percent of all cancers in women. In the United States it is the ninth most common cancer among women and is the fifth leading cause of cancer-related death among women. These statistics alone make it the deadliest gynecologic cancer. The American Cancer Society estimates that in 2010 there will be 21,880 new cases diagnosed and 13,850 deaths. During 2003-

2007, the majority of patients diagnosed with ovarian cancer were aged 55 to 64, with the median age at diagnosis being 63. During this same time, the median age at death was 71. Caucasian women have a higher incidence and death rate of ovarian cancers than other races. However, African-American women have a lower five year survival rate than Caucasian women (36.8% vs. 45.4%). The overall 5-year and 10-year survival rate of ovarian cancer is 45.6% and 39%, respectively. Relative survival rate increases the sooner a woman is diagnosed. If the cancer is localized to the ovaries,

the overall 5-year relative survival rate is 93.5%. If the cancer has spread to the lymph nodes around the ovaries, the overall 5-year relative survival rate decreases to 73.4%. If the cancer has metastasized to other areas of the body, the overall 5-year relative survival rate decreases to an abysmal 27.6%. Luckily for women, the overall lifetime risk of developing ovarian cancer is 1.39% or in other words, 1 in 72 women will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer during their lifetime.

Over the next two years, we will learn more about screening and prevention of ovarian cancer, diagnosis and staging, the treatment options available to patients, clinical trials available to ovarian cancer patients and the main types of ovarian cancer.
