# 2008-2010 Women's Health Issue: Cervical Cancer Charity Dorothea Andrews, Pharm.D

Cervical cancer is a well-understood form of cancer and is also probably the most preventable<sup>1</sup>. The truth in this statement is evidenced by the 74% decrease in the cervical cancer death rate between 1955 and 1992<sup>2</sup>. The death rate continues to drop by approximately four percent each year. This decline is amazing given that cervical cancer used to be one of the most common causes of death for American women and is now ranked twelfth in cancer death for women in the United States. Worldwide, cervical cancer is the second or third most common cancer among women and cancer-related mortality<sup>1</sup>. However, disparities do exist in the United States. These disparities are due to a lack of preventative screening. Under-screened populations include older women, uninsured and impoverished women, migrant and minority women, and those living in rural areas, particularly the Mississippi Delta, the Black Belt region, the United States-Mexico border and Appalachia<sup>1</sup>.

Cervical cancer is typically diagnosed in women aged 35 to 50 and is rarely diagnosed in women younger than 20 years of age. Of those women diagnosed with cervical cancer, approximately 20% are over the age of 65<sup>2</sup>. Cervical cancer occurs two times more often in Hispanic women than non-Hispanic white women and African-American women develop cervical cancer 1.5 times more often than non-Hispanic white women. Among Asian American/Pacific Islander women the rate of developing cervical cancer is slightly higher than non-Hispanic white women. However, Native American/Alaskan Native women have even lower rate of developing cancer than non-Hispanic white women<sup>3</sup>.

Risk factors for the development of cervical cancer include human papillomavirus (HPV), smoking, weakened immune system, Chlamydia infection, diet, birth control, multiple pregnancies, lower socioeconomic status and family history<sup>2</sup>. High risk sexual behaviors by a male partner can also lead to an increased risk of cervical cancer for a woman. Of these risk factors, HPV is considered the most significant. Amazingly, more than one-third of American women will be infected with HPV by the age of 24<sup>4</sup>.

HPV is the most common sexually transmitted infection<sup>5</sup>. It is estimated that 20 million Americans are currently infected with HPV and another 6.2 million will be infected each year. HPV infections occur mainly in women less than the age of 30, but the exact reason is not known why. HPV is thought to be more common in uncircumcised men and that these men may be able to pass the virus along to other people<sup>2</sup>. HPV infections are usually cleared by the immune system and do not ultimately result in cervical cancer. However, certain types of HPV are associated with a greater likelihood of developing cervical cancer. The high-risk types of HPV include HPV 16, 18, 31, 33 and 45. However, approximately two-thirds of cervical cancer can be contributed to HPV 16 and 18<sup>2</sup>.

Lambda Kappa Sigma has chosen Cervical Cancer as our Women's Health Issue for the current biennium. Over the biennium, we will be providing additional information about screening, staging, treatment and prevention strategies through a series of articles in our publications.
